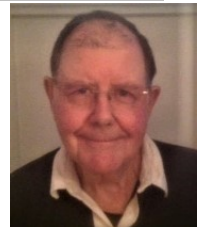

EASTER SUNDAY

WHY DO YOU LOOK FOR THE LIVING AMONG THE DEAD?

The resurrection of Jesus changes everything. It changes the meaning of life. It changes the meaning of death. It changes the meaning of love.

If Jesus is alive, the meaning of life cannot be limited to the accumulation of power, prestige and possessions.

If Jesus is alive, death is not the final thing that will happen to us.



And, if Jesus is alive, the eternal language we use when we talk about love, (“I will love you, forever”) finally makes sense.

But is Jesus really alive? Most people in our generation don’t think so. They consider it to be a primitive and unscientific belief – a mark of gullibility and intellectual immaturity.

And yet all over the world, this Easter Sunday, people from all kinds of educational and cultural backgrounds, will gather to celebrate the resurrection, claiming personal knowledge of the risen Jesus.

The words of the angels help us to understand why. We’ll consider them, as we also celebrate the fact that Jesus is alive forevermore.

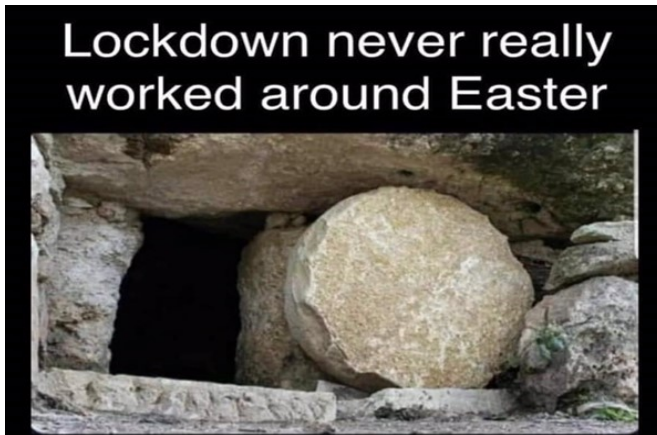

BECAUSE OF **CALVARY'S CROWN.**

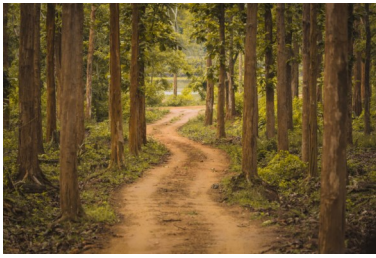

rarely realising they need to look after their souls.

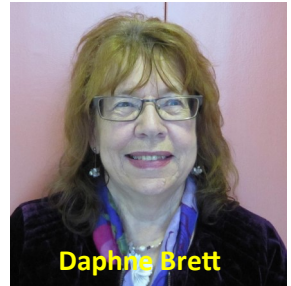
The road I now travel is narrower, that is true,

Abba's storehouse has everything to help me **winningly** proceed.

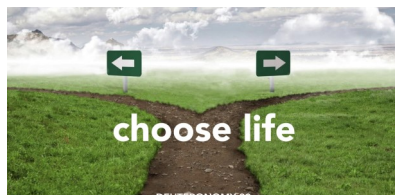
On this road I'm protected with the Heavenly Father's care,

My road leads to Jesus, and my **glorious resurrection**.

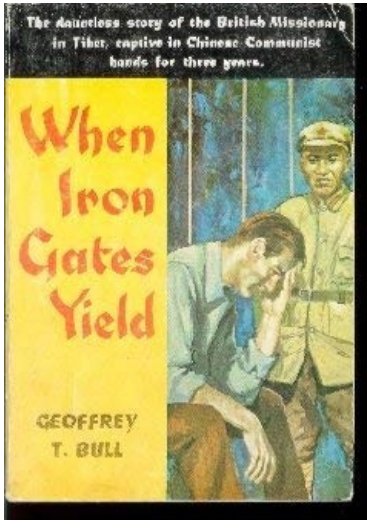

The Road Less Travelled

I have been meditating on Matthew 7:13-14 and concluded that, as believers, there is a sense in which we are by definition a people on a 'road less travelled'. Having chosen the small gate and the narrow way we find ourselves amongst the 'few there be that find it'.



I moved on in my meditation to remember those who have given a particular accent to the idea of a road less travelled. Geoffrey Bull was a hero of the faith in the middle of the last century, a Brethren missionary to Tibet who was arrested by Chinese Communists, imprisoned in China, tortured and held in solitary confinement for three years. Surviving to tell the tale he wrote a brilliant book, 'When Iron Gates Yield', which was well received by the secular press as well as within Christian circles. I still have a copy from that time and have decided to dust it down and reread it for my own inspiration. He was also a celebrated preacher. As a youngster, I remember he was held in awe because drawing from his time in China, his preaching carried extra weight.

Then, in more recent times, I thought of Terry Waite, who had a similar experience but without the torture! He was taken in 1987 by Shiite Muslim kidnappers in Beirut, Lebanon, and held for four years. He never questioned his faith. He used to say to his captors, "You have the power to break my body and bend my mind but my soul is not yours to possess".

Finally, I reflected on my own experience. You may have read of my life well travelled but the last 14 years have been quite different, certainly less travelled in a physical sense. My wife, Rose, was struck down with a large brain tumour which has necessitated 12 major operations over the years. Now the tumour has returned and this time is inoperable. Physically and mentally she is declining and is blind. For me, this has meant suffering, loneliness and pain as I watch her suffer, and yet enrichment as I know I am in the centre of God's will for me as I care for her and embrace His comfort, strength and enabling.

I have some great, loyal friends who are not believers. One of them said, "We don't know how you do it but I suppose it must have something to do with your faith". I assured her she was right!

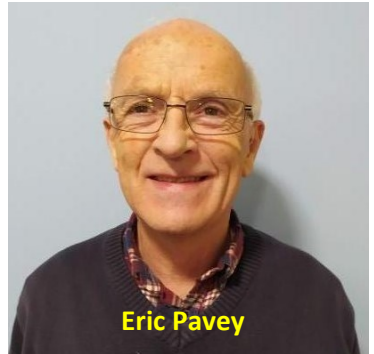
I am not an angel, nor am I perfect, but I am sustained by His power. I have 'grace to help in time of need' and His grace is sufficient. I can say with Habakkuk, 'the Sovereign Lord is my strength'. *(continued overleaf)*

... I would rather not see my wife, life partner and friend, suffer in order for me to learn some of these things, but I am convinced God knows best and one day I will understand. So my meditations shift seamlessly from the general to the specific and then the very personal.

As many have suffered through covid and now the through the war in Ukraine, my prayer is that out of all the sickness, suffering and evil intents of men will emerge stories of people turning to God and finding forgiveness and comfort just as we have done. Then we will have company on our journey and the road less travelled will become the road more travelled.

Time to stop meditating for now. Thank you for joining me.

We want Barabbas

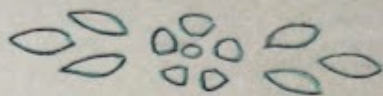
And what shall be done with Christ? We cry

MIRACLES OF JESUS

VICTORY OVER DISEASE

LUKE 5 : 21 – 34

One crowd sighed with relief as they saw Jesus leave, but another crowd was waiting to welcome Him when He returned home to Capernaum. In that crowd were two people who were desperate to see Him, Jairus, a man with a dying daughter, and a woman suffering from an incurable disease.



Jairus was the first to see Jesus, but it was the woman who was helped first. What a contrast between two needy people, revealing the wideness of Christ's love. Jairus was seen by the community as very important. He was a ruler, head of the synagogue. He was president of the board of elders, responsible for the good management of the synagogue, responsible for the conduct of the services, for the allocation of services, that they were carried out in good order. Jairus, one of the most respected people in the community! What a contrast to the lady who was a "nobody!" What a welcome from the Master! Jairus was about to lose a daughter who had given him twelve years of happiness (Mark 5:42) and the woman, desperate to lose an illness that had brought twelve years of sorrow. Because of the haemorrhage, she was treated as an outcast of society. Jairus, no doubt was wealthy, but money could not save his daughter. The woman was bankrupt, having spent all her money on doctors. (No NHS where she lived!) Both Jairus and the woman found the answer to their needs at the feet of Jesus. (Mark 5:22)



At the feet of Jesus

The woman had a flow of blood that was apparently incurable, an illness gradually sapping her strength day after day. When one considers all her disappointments with the doctors, she also had another burden. According to the Law, she was ceremonially unclean which greatly restricted both her religious and her social life. (Lev 15:19)

“When a woman has a regular flow of blood, the impurity of her monthly period will last seven days and anyone who touches her will be unclean.”

But she let nothing stand in her way as she pushed through the crowd to get to Jesus. She could have used any number of excuses to stay away from Jesus. She ...

... might have said, "I'm not important enough to ask Jesus for help. Look! He's talking to Jairus! I won't bother Him now."

What kind of faith did she have? It was weak, timid and maybe full of doubt – she kept saying to herself, "Just touch Jesus' coat and that will do it!" She was not disappointed. Jesus honoured her faith, weak as it was, and healed her body.

Maybe there is a lesson for us. Not everybody has the same degree of faith, but Jesus responds, no matter how feeble our faith.

The woman planned to slip away and get lost in the crowd, but Jesus turned and stopped her. He wanted to be more than a healer. He wanted to be her Saviour. He called her "daughter" and sent her on her way, spiritually and physically healed.

Meanwhile, one of Jairus' friends arrived to say his daughter had died. (Mark 5:35 – 43) It could not have been easy for Jairus, publicly to ask for help from Jesus. The religious leaders were opposed to Jesus. The things that Jesus had done aroused the anger of the scribes and Pharisees, but Jairus was desperate. He would rather lose his friends and save his beautiful daughter. At this point, Jairus had to believe. What did Jesus say to Jairus? "Be not afraid but go on believing." As we would say today: "Don't quit! Keep on believing!"

Did Jairus think "if only it had not been for that woman?!" When Jesus and Jairus arrived at Jairus' house, they saw and heard professional Jewish mourners who were always called when there is a death.

What did Jesus say? "The child is not dead but asleep."



What words of hope to Jairus and his wife.

Unbelief laughs at God's Word, but faith experiences the power of God.

Jesus added, "I say unto thee, little girl, get up!"

The girl not only came back to life but she was healed of her sickness. Jesus instructed the parents to give her some food.

What a Saviour! Master of disease, but also death. He still is working today.

These miracles illustrate how Jesus met and helped all kinds of people. Hallelujah, what a Saviour!
